## **POLICY STATEMENT**

Dayton High School expects ethical behavior from all students. Academic dishonesty takes many forms, including cheating or copying the work of another, using technology for illicit purposes, or cheating on a test. Academic dishonesty is strictly prohibited in all forms. Dayton's academic dishonesty policy covers all in and out of class assignments, tests, papers, and projects. The purpose of Dayton's academic integrity policy is to instill the importance of having integrity in your work and the seriousness of unethical behavior as well as the dire consequences that can accompany academic dishonesty in college and beyond.

All students will sign a contract at the start of each year or upon enrollment. These contracts will be kept on file in the Guidance Office. Determining a student's engagement in academic dishonesty will be based on specific evidence provided by the teacher or other supervising employee. This may include written materials, observation or any other evidence provided.

Students determined to have engaged in academic dishonesty will be subject to the following academic and/or disciplinary consequences.

## **Dayton High School Academic Integrity Contract**

Dayton High School expects ethical behavior from all students. Academic dishonesty is strictly prohibited in all forms. Dayton's academic dishonesty policy covers all in and out of class assignments, tests, papers, and projects. The purpose of Dayton's academic integrity policy is to instill the importance of having integrity in your work and the seriousness of unethical behavior as well as the dire consequences that can accompany academic dishonesty in college and beyond.

Cheating includes, but is not limited to, the following examples:

- Using an assignment that belongs to someone else and using it as your own. •
- Allowing someone to use an assignment of yours as their own. •
- Looking at someone's test (with or without their permission) and copying the whole or any part of it to submit as your own.
- Submitting the work of a parent, friend, or sibling as your own work. ٠
- Working on individual assignments as a group.
- Using any type of 'cheat sheet,' written or electronically recorded. •

Dishonesty includes, but is not limited to, the following examples:

- Agreeing with other students to commit academic dishonesty.
- Falsifying research •

Plagiarism includes, but is not limited to, the following examples:

- Directly quoting or paraphrasing all or part of another's written or spoken words without documenting the source. •
- Presenting an idea, theory or concept belonging to someone else as your own. •
- Copying and pasting from any online source without proper documentation. •
- Changing just a few words of a quotation does not prevent plagiarism. •
- Using another student's work even with permission is still plagiarism. •
